not politicians.

We don't need to understand everything about each other or agree with each other's decisions in order to treat one another with dignity and respect. We don't know someone's circumstances. That's why it's better that each person makes the decision that's best for them --

Highlighting positive values/visions

economic worries, and more.

Extremist politicians tried to run away from their positions against abortions, changed voters. They dodged questions, changed their websites, and even lied about their support for abortion bans.

 This was an election unlike any other, with voters being targeted with misinformation, outside interference, threats of violence, and issues like freedom, democracy,

Talking about discrepancies between ballot votes and candidate choice

Remind your audience: Threats Remain

Inequities that disproportionately harm Black and Indigenous communities, which have historically faced significantly higher rates of maternal mortality than their White peers. ⁵

Pregnant people are being denied critical, time-sensitive, emergency healthcare.

states that have banned abortion or are planning to ban abortion have fewer maternity care providers, more maternity care deserts and higher rates of maternal mortality and infant death than states where abortion is accessible.⁵

Diminished medical training opportunities can potentially lead to a decline in clinical skills, knowledge and experience, ultimately impacting patient experience and access to care. 5

Medical providers are leaving and considering leaving states where they might be persecuted ⁵

Abortion bans hurt all of us, including those seeking to end a pregnancy and anyone considering a pregnancy in the future.

STOP BANNING ABORTION.

For example, in **Florida** the requirement for the ballot measure to pass was 60% instead of a simple majority (they got 57% of the votes; 6,000,000+ people voted to enshrine abortion rights in the state!), and in Nebraska opponents ran a competing measure to confuse voters.

We also saw ballot measures on abortion in states with a more challenging landscape than in 2022 and there were myriad legal challenges from extremist opponents.

- New York- passed Proposal 1
- Nevada-passed Right to Abortion Initiative
 - Montana- passed CI-128
 - Freedom Amendment

 Missouri- passed Amendment 3
- Maryland- passed Right to Reproductive
 - Colorado- passed Amendment 79
 - Arizona- passed Proposition 139

Abortion was on the ballot in 10 states, and 7 of them won! 3

Claim and visibilize the wins!

<u>Promoting unconditional support for abortion care- why and how</u>

Conditional support of abortion access can perpetuate abortion stigma. Conversations with people who aren't totally against abortion but still make stigmatizing statements about abortion (I'm pro-choice but...) are some of the most important.

- 1.I'm pro choice but... only up 'til certain number of weeks: Later abortions happen for a lot of different reasons, and everyone deserves access to whatever care they need throughout their pregnancy.
- 2.I'm pro-choice but... only if you have a good reason: Every reason is valid, period. All pregnancies are different, and we should trust those seeking abortion care to make decisions for themselves and their situation.

No one should be denied care because of who they are, how they are insured, or where they live. Reinforce core values held by a majority of voters! (such as freedom)

candidate behavior.

Polls consistently showed voters want abortion to be legal & available nationally. This is true across faith, age, party, and race. ^{1 2}
 Abortion was a top issue for voters and was talked about more in this election than ever before. That's a positive: it changed the narrative, educated voters, and influenced educated voters, and influenced

Support for abortion care shaped this election- from what candidates discussed, to the stories we heard, to how people voted.

Despite the outcome, it's clear that voters across party, race, religion, & age don't want abortion bans or politicians interfering in their personal decisions.
